Comments to the Author

All in all, this is an insightful treatment of transitions in the understanding of Indigeneity in Indonesia. The theoretical treatment in terms of dialectical relations between the state and Indigenous groups is well explicated and deployed. The historical treatment is of a scale well suited to a **journal** article, and the case study of Enrekang illustrates nicely what the authors label the 'local turn' in the dynamics of recognition. However, the article could be improved by some clarification of terminology, and the notion of the 'local turn' needs to be adjusted once the notion of peraturan daerah – local regulations, not local laws – is better contextualised.

Some of the ambiguities in the notion of Indigeneity as a theoretical term should be clarified by making a clearer distinction between Indigeneity and Autochthony. In this article the two terms are used as largely synonymous, but they do connote different understandings. The latter term, used quite often in African and European studies, applies in the Indonesian case to the term 'pribumi', which is often used to designate all the peoples of Austronesian and Papuan ancestry/descent in the archipelago, as opposed to descendants of Chinese, Arab, Indian, European and other foreign origin. It is on this basis that Suharto rejected the notion of a special class of Indigenous societies (Mahathir analogously rejected the concept of Indigenous societies by reference to bumiputera in Malaysia). In postcolonial Indonesia pribumi cannot be defined as marginal. However, most all attempted universal definitions of 'Indigenous', such as by the United Nations, posit some form of oppressed or at least marginal status. Masyarakat Adat, as defined by AMAN and other groups, can fit this category, though even in that formulation there are fuzzy boundaries (e.g. have Batak groups been that marginal, to take the case of the ethnic group of the longest-serving secretary general of AMAN?). In any case, masyarakat adat have self-defined as marginal. Using this analytical distinction could help clarify the history of terms and discourses in Indonesia with which the paper engages in its opening section. Granted that there is ambiguity in some terms (e.g. Inlander during the Dutch colonial period), but overall this distinction can help clarify distinct usages. See my annotations on the draft for where I think autochthonous should be used in place of Indigeny/ous (and sometimes vice versa). The paper does use the term autochthon (sometimes where the adjectival term autochthonous should be used, as noted in my annotations on the draft), but does not sufficiently distinguish it from Indigenous. By the way, I should note that representatives in the global Indigenous movement prefer for the term to be capitalised (i.e. Indigenous rather than indigenous), but I realise that the house style of some journals mandates lower case).

I agree that in the masyarakat adat movement, discourses often portray these societies as 'less hierarchical', but it should be acknowledged that many if not most of these societies have as an integral part of their adat local rank systems based on hierarchy. Very often members of local adat councils must be of noble rank by local reckoning.

The way in which the 'local turn' is articulated should also be changed. The author(s) renders both undang and peraturan as 'law(s)'. These need to be differentiated as 'law(s)' and 'regulation(s)' respectively. It is a feature of all laws in the Indonesian legal system that they cannot be implemented directly. They require 'implementing regulations' at various levels in order to actually be realised. These are the 'peraturan daerah', which can be at provincial and regency level (and even lower down to the village). So, the reason that AMAN and other Indigenous groups are focussing on peraturan daerah is not so much (or at least not only) that they have been disappointed with politics at the national level (there is indeed disappointment) and feel they can be more effective at the local level, but having gained some proclaimed successes with the Constitutional Court decision on customary forest in 2013 and the UU masyarakat adat they realise that in order for such national level decisions to be implemented, they must be realised through implementing regulations or peraturan daerah (e.g. the peraturan of Kabupaten Lebak that recognised a number of customary forest areas in the regency). This point does not invalidate the assertion of a 'local turn', but it accounts for that in terms of an inherent feature of the Indonesian legal system — the necessity for laws to be implemented through local regulations — rather than just a change of focus on the part of masyarakat adat activists out of disappointment. It is a subtle, but important distinction.

There are a number of minor errors in the paper (e.g. Taman Mini Indonesia Indah is located in East Jakarta, not South Jakarta). The author(s) should consult my annotations on the paper for queries and corrections on these. The author(s) refer to the series of national congresses that AMAN has held. I think she/he/they has not yet taken on board the pronouncements and plans that were proclaimed at the 20th anniversary Congress at Taman Ismail Marzuki, Jakarta, in August, 2019. Some reference to these might help confirm and in some cases modify what she/he/they asserts as the major trends in AMAN and the masyarakat adat movement generally. Reference can be made to the AMAN website and publications (e.g. GONG AMAN) that were issued at this 20th anniversary congress.

The references for the paper are impressive, but there are a few more that should be added and cited in the body of the article (e.g. Barbara Harvey's thesis on Kahar Muzakkar's rebellion: Havey, Barbara Sillars 1974 Tradition, Islam and Rebellion: South Sulawesi 1950-1965. PhD thesis, Cornell University. (never published as a book in English, but an Indonesian translation, possibly abridged, was published as a book). Carol Warren's book on desa adat and desa dinas in Bali should also be cited and referenced.

The writing in the paper is largely clear, but there are some issues with such grammatical rules as agreement in number between subject and verb and the need for more commas to render the phrase and clause structure of sentences clearer. I have provided suggested corrections in my annotations for these shortcomings. Some of the paragraphs are rather long, so I have also suggested where some paragraphs might be broken into two or three paragraphs.

This is a very insightful paper and deserves to be published, but attending to the clarifications above would strengthen the argument and insulate the paper from potential criticisms.

Reviewer 2:

This is an interesting article and I support publication, but only due to some substantial revisions.

I think the author has to re-write some paragraphs, because especially to the reader who is not well-acquainted with Indonesian history and terminology, it is not always easy to understand. Moreover, sometimes the articles is too ambitious and could be streamlined. This in particular with reference to the part on Hegel that seems to me unnecessary. This could be deleted in favour of detailed explanation in other parts of the paper. Moreover, the dialectical relationship of state and indigenous groups is hinted at a few times, but the narrative constructed around this dialectics is only tentatively outlined and explained.

To readers who are not familiar with the mainstream definition of indigeneity or an Indonesian identity the part on populist versus conservative indigeneity is a bit confusing. First, why does the author use the term "populist" (on page 6 it becomes "popular")? If this term is used it has to be defined (is it related to the extensive literature now coming up?). It is also not clear how the mainstream definition looks like today. I would like to see more explanation. Besides, during the New Order the term "pribumi" seemed to indicate a concept of indigeneity. What role did it play and is it still playing? (think of Anies Baswedan after being elected and the whole Ahok issue and the position of ethnic Chinese Indonesians) I think at least a passage about the current discourse would be very helpful. Which ethnic groups are marginalized? Only the very small communities or also larger ones such as Batak, Balinese etc.? On page 8, for example, it is mentioned that Javanese culture was (and is?) somehow central. This needs much more elaboration.

The article could be improved with more subheadings (esp. between page 3 and 9). The case study should also be clearly mentioned in the subheading. Moreover, the author should explain whether he/she had been there for field research, interviews should be mentioned with name and date, also maybe some other sources. What was the methodology used?

On the "local turn": It would be interesting to see whether this is a general trend. If yes, mention literature and maybe other cases. Or are there authors who do not see it as a new trend?

All in all, I recommend publication after these major revisions.

Minor comments: some spelling mistakes: Polanzas, Massenreplu; check Indonesian terms
On page 3: there is a mistake in the quotation. It has to be: 'rules'
Page 9 on the indigenous activists: are there numbers on how many actually voted for whom? Did you use interviews? If yes, give a few names.
